Diagnosis: Cerebral Palsy

Background:

Cerebral Palsy (CP) affects as many as four hundred thousand children and adults in the United States. It occurs as a result of damage to one or more specific areas of the brain. The most common cause is insufficient amounts of oxygen reaching the fetus or the newborn baby's brain.

Common symptoms consist of limited cognition, speech impairment, muscle tightness, or spasm, involuntary movements, and severe disturbances in gait and mobility.

Eric was diagnosed with cerebral palsy when he was six months old.

Some of his symptoms included a continuous drooling, severe spasticity of his extremities and he was completely unable to move on his own.

His cognitive abilities were also significantly diminished. He had great difficulty understanding what was said to him, as well as an inability to express any of his wants or needs to his parents.

Post Fetal Stem Cells:

Eric first received Fetal Stem Cell therapy when he was three years old.

Afterward, his mother wrote: "The next day after Eric received the Fetal Stem Cells, he started crawling on all fours. This is something he had never been able to do before, though he'd tried many times in the past.

"Another important change we noticed soon after his treatment was that Eric's cognitive abilities markedly improved. He is using words, able to follow commands and is also for the first time making some commands of his own.

He's expressing his likes and dislikes and now it's obvious that he knows what's going on all around him.

Wherever the other kids are is where he has to be now, something that was never the case before his treatment. The other day, the other children all went outside to play and I picked him up, because he was heading out the door yelling, outside, outside!' over and over. ”

“He is communicating so much better, and is now capable of giving us high fives. Last week, he also started to wave. He's trying to teach himself how to use a spoon to eat. He can already get the spoon to his mouth. Before, he couldn't even manage to hold the spoon.

Now he is able to maneuver his toys and no longer drools at all!

Since his treatment, he enjoys calling out to each family member by name while balancing himself standing on the couch.”

“Eric is also exhibiting many positive changes at his special education school. So many that they have decided to videotape him so they can keep track of them all. Both his teacher and I have noticed how much better he is at paying attention. In the past, he didn't look at you when you spoke, to him, or to others nearby. His teacher said now in class, he would turn his head and look at each child when they spoke and that he was really trying hard to soak it all in.

Eric is also very excited and enthusiastic about his progress, and really making an effort to say new words. He is able to move his mouth differently now, so that every day it becoming easier and easier to understand what he's saying.

Eric is a very happy, content child, who loves to play. He's just getting better and better.”
